Also, if you still have a balance for your dues, please send in a partial payment to show that you are still interested in your membership with the Knights.



ADVOCATE'S ADVICE

Last month I wrote about how The Diary of St. Faustina has several passages that are conversations with Jesus. There are also just a few entries that were recorded as conversations with Our Mother Mary. These entries show the words of Mary in italics. There were just a few entries, but all very significant. I have typed one of these entries below from paragraph 785. In this paragraph, Mary taught St. Faustina how to prepare for Christmas. Since Christmas will be here before we know it, I thought it would be appropriate to share.

"November 29, 1936. The Mother of God has taught me how to prepare


for the Feast of Christmas. I saw Her today, without the Infant Jesus. She said to me: My daughter, strive after silence and humility, so that Jesus, who dwells in your heart continuously, may be able to rest. Adore him in your heart; do not go out from your inmost being. My daughter, I shall obtain for you the grace of an interior life which will be such that, without ever leaving that interior life, you will be able to carry out all you external duties with even greater care. Dwell with Him continuously in your own heart. He will be your strength. Communicate with creatures only in so far as is

necessary and is required by your

duties. You are a dwelling place pleasing to the living God; in you He dwells continuously with love and delight. And, the living presence of God, which you experience in a vivid and distinct way, will confirm you. Try to act this way until Christmas Day, and then He himself will make known to you in what way you will be communing and uniting yourself with Him."

After reading it, you may think that much of it is a personal message from Our Mother to St. Faustina, but I urge you to read it closer and pray about it.

Lecturer's Notes: Summer to Advent—Fourth Quarter!!!

"Resplendent and unfading is Wisdom, and she is readily perceived by those who love her, and found by those who seek her. She hastens to make herself known to those who desire her; one who watches for her at dawn will not be disappointed, for she will be found sitting at the gate. For setting your heart on her is the perfection of prudence, and whoever keeps vigil for her is quickly free from care; because she makes her rounds, seeking those worthy of her, and graciously appears to them on the way, and goes to meet them with full attention." - Wisdom 6: 12-16

"Wisdom is the book that is filled with wisdom," an old friend once told me. He would often open the bible to read from these pages and be inspired to be a better person and a better businessman. In those days I didn't get it, but today I see things differently. The theme of this passage reminds us to search for truth because truth is searching for us, and we don't want to miss that meeting. Keep that theme in mind as we consider where we are in the liturgical year. October is a rich time of change in the Central Valley where we live as well as in our faith. The days become noticeably shorter, the evenings cool, and the garden yields begin to wind down in preparation for winter. Sounds like the scheme of life. October ends with the theme of death as the secular world around us celebrates Halloween with trickery and

ghoulish themes. In the Sunday Mass readings of October, Jesus speaks in parables which invite us to look inward at our spiritual state. In the October gospels we see smart men trying to trip Him up and we would be wise to consider if we are doing that very same thing. The gospel themes throughout the month are of accountability. Does my behavior merit eternity in heaven? October is also the month of Mary and her rosary. Spiritually, November is like the confluence of many streams, the place where everything comes together. All streams lead to Heaven. As secular October ends with death. Catholic Christians begin the last month of the liturgical year by celebrating "All Saints Day". All Saints Day honors those deceased in Purgatory and those who have entered the kingdom of Heaven and live now in the eternal presence of God. Hopefully, one day we will be counted among their number so we may be celebrating our own achievements; hooray! As the gospel themes of October challenge us to review our actions and motives, the November gospels bring accountability into a much sharper focus. Restated, as the culture centers itself on trickery and death, the Church raises our focus to eternity with God. Again, this is the place where everything comes together. Once our attention is raised to God then we can truly search for Him. The four weeks of December

mark the season of Advent, a

time of joyful waiting for the

coming of the King. Just as

concentrated light passing through a magnifying glass can start a fire so the season of Advent can bring us to Jesus and Jesus to us. Advent marks the first month of the new liturgical year whose theme brings us to the person of God at the foot of the manger at Christmas. At Christmas God presents himself to us not as a man of wealth to whom we owe a debt, or of power whom we should fear, but as an innocent baby that we should want to pick up and love and nurture. Who could be easier to form a bond with then a newborn baby who holds no notions about us? This baby is the one who searches for us in the hope that we will desire to search for him.
