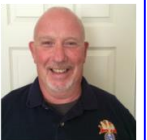
holding a 4th degree card. The dinner cost is \$15 dollars, which includes ribs, beans, salad, roll and dessert.

Dear Knights,
 As we pass once again through the holy days of Palm Sunday and Holy Week, we rediscover what it means to be Christian and Catholic men. Being a Christian means courageously following our beloved Savior who said "If you wish to be my disciple, take up your Cross and follow me." (Matthew 16:24) Being a man means shouldering the Cross without complaining in imitation of Christ, who is the perfect man (Gaudium et Spes #22).
 How can I become a perfect man? The best strategy is to spend time every day meditating on the mysteries of the life of Jesus. A real man prays his rosary daily to "contemplate the life of Jesus through the eyes of Mary" (St. John Paul II "*Rosarium Virginis Mariae*" #12)
 We begin Holy Week by looking at how Jesus entered the Holy City of Jerusalem. He entered because every Jewish man at that time was required by Jewish law to go up to Jerusalem for the Feast of Passover. Jesus gave a good example of a good man who obeyed religious laws.

CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE

Every Jewish man was required to go to the holy city with a Pascal Sacrifice which was usually a lamb which would be slaughtered in the evening twilight on Passover eve. He would arrive carrying a lamb for the Passover Sacrifice.

At Passover time that year the crowds knew that the Pharisees wanted to put Jesus to death, so the people wondered whether Jesus would have the courage to come to the Passover Feast: "So they were looking for Jesus, and were saying to one another as they stood in the temple, 'What do you think; that He will not come to the feast at all?'" (John 11:56) Of course Jesus did come. He entered the city triumphantly on a donkey with the crowds waving palms and welcoming him as their king. This made the authorities suspicious and made it even more dangerous for Jesus. Jesus enter the city on Palm Sunday he was not carrying a Pascal Sacrifice. He himself would be the Lamb of Sacrifice for Passover.

Jesus is our example of a good man because he obeyed the religious laws of his Jewish faith. He did not care what others would

think or say and he was not afraid of persecution. There is also another way in which Jesus is an example of a good man. A good man shows respect for women. A good man honors his mother and upholds the dignity of every woman. A good man acknowledges that he needs the care and nurturing of those women in his life who show him motherly tenderness. We see this quality in Jesus when he goes up to the Holy City of Jerusalem. In the Bible the city of Jerusalem is often referred to as the spiritual mother of the People of God. So when Jesus obeyed the Jewish law and went up to the Holy City, he was acknowledging that he needed the spiritual nourishment of his spiritual mother. He was not a macho loner bent on preserving his rugged individualism. He was not like those men who wait outside of Mass because they think they don't need Mother Church. We should follow the example of Jesus

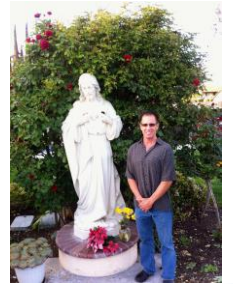

My dear Brother Knights, I have news that it is both good and bad at the same time. If you were at the March Business Meeting, you have heard the news already, but since many of you were not able to be present, I want to share the news here. Many of you may not know, but I left my last job on July 1, 2015 for a variety of different reasons. I assumed at the time that I would have no problem finding another similar job within a month or two. Unfortunately, when that one or two months dragged on to 3, 4, and 5, I began to think about a possible change in career. It was at that time that I received the email from the General Agent of the Knights of Columbus for our area, Steve Hudec, stating that he had career opportunities. I remember hearing our assigned Field Agent, Julio Valadez, state that he was spread across a large area, living in Livingston but working for our Council. I responded to the email, if nothing else, to see what was required. Next thing that I knew, I was interviewing in Fresno, taking an online assessment, interviewing again in Fresno, having my wife interviewed, and signing up to take a course to get my license to sell life insurance. Don't get me wrong, when I first heard the words "selling" and "insurance" together, immediately I started imagining those stereotypical car salesmen hanging out to

sell you something your "really need." (I apologize if you are a "good" car salesman, but you must know the stereotype as much as the rest of us, no?) I worked in education for almost 30 years, what was I going to do in sales? But, the more I thought about it, the more I realized that I had been selling education all of the time. On top of that, all of the individuals with whom I interacted, from our former Field Agent Bill (who sold me my policy) to Julio and onto Steve Hudec had none of those characteristics. They did not, and still do not, come across with being concerned about selling for the sake of selling, but rather finding a way to meet the needs of their Brother Knights in continuing to meet the needs of their families. That was something that I could get behind.

I continued through the entire process of class, testing, re-interviewing and paperwork and on March 1st, I started officially as a Field Agent, #17081! After 8 months of being unemployed, I have a job that so far is VERY rewarding. I have a steep learning curve ahead of me, but that is not entirely a bad thing. The bad news related with being a Field Agent is that I am assigned to Council in our area: St. Joseph's, St. Stanislaus, Our Lady of Fatima, St. Francis of Rome, and the two Councils in Oakdale. Being that I am assigned to these Councils, I am no longer able to continue as an Officer within our Council. ☹ That means that

we are in need, yet again of another Officer. The best part is that whoever steps up will have only a couple of months until the end of the Columbian year. My hope, and that of the other Officers, is that whoever steps forward can use these couple of months as preparation for all of next year!

Our Council ends up benefiting in the long run since our Field Agent will once again be a familiar face that will be at most if not all of our Business Meetings! That should make it that much easier to contact when we have a possible need for life or disability insurance, long term care, or want to talk about long term savings opportunities. I look forward to working for and with all of you!
