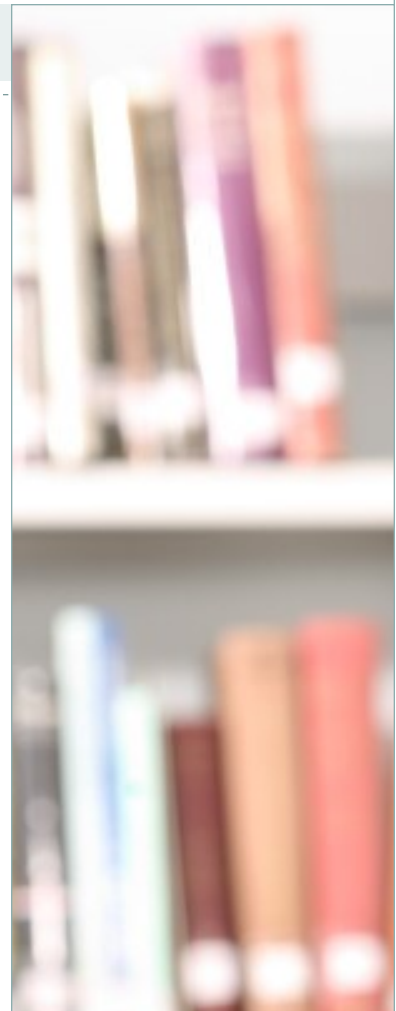
Knight Light Newsletter

LECTURER'S MESSAGE

Happy December. First off most important message: I love you all. The title of my article this month is "There is no room at the inn here at St. Joseph's" or "Sit in a pew, just not in mine," or "There's not enough chairs, we prefer you sit in the vestibule or chapel. You pick!"

I agree: it does not sound funny at all; and it is not meant to! I would also like to mention: I realize I'm speaking musical theory to the choir, but I've prayed about what I have been personally experiencing in our beautiful sanctuary for a while; and I've got to tell you, it's been painful to watch. As I prayed, I thought of this vehicle to make us all aware and for solutions. After discerning to write about this Catholic phenomenon, I heard an interview on Relevant Radio about the same concern by a Catholic priest who stated this was becoming a big problem in parishes as of late. I think the solution is very easy and simple and any of you that usher already know.

Here are a couple of my most recent experiences. Mind you, these things are happening at every mass. I arrived at mass on time (one of the things I am working on and have been falling short) As we were standing and singing the opening hymn, people are still arriving and trying to humbly find seating whether one person or a whole family of five or family of seven. I can see whole pews, several of them, wide open with able-bodied "bookends." People who are of good health sitting on the ends of the pew courageously guarding the pew, so no one else can sit in their private sanctuary. I wrote that to sound funny. Do not get me wrong, if you are one of those "bookends," I still love you.

Common sense says, "There's a simple solution there." If you have a health issue or are help in the mass where you need to get in and out of the pew without disturbing others, then it is totally understandable and thoughtful. Sit on the end, but still welcome people in make room for them and explain. When I help with collections, I like to sit on the end and try to find a full pew with just one opening at the end. If I am not helping, and I am by myself, I will go to the middle of an open pew, and then two families of five can easily sit on either side. At this particular mass, my friend and his family of four showed up before the song was over and stood next to one of those "bookends" and I saw him politely gesture to the young woman several times inches from her. She was not even singing. Now, it could be that she has a hearing handicap. He had to go one pew forward just to experience more of the same. Honestly, there was a large open pew two people one on either end. My friend politely gestured several times trying to get the person attention to share the pew. Once he did the look he received from the "bookend"! Let us just say it was not warm and fuzzy. My friend and his family maintained their joyful composure, as usual, as I stood gonvicted by God in my pew.

I wanted to scream out, "Is it that difficult to get a seat in the most beautiful place in Modesto?" God spoke to me, "Patience, Stephen."

It went on and on as people were searching for seats and the downright ugly look on faces at times. I wanted to yell out, "Your scowling face is not Catholic!"

Or maybe it is. If a non-believer or one of our protestant brothers were visiting and experienced that they might say that is a Catholic experience all right. I sure would not want them or anybody else to say that. On the other hand, I have seen people rudely almost force their way in to a pew before a group of kind parishioners or unaware "bookends" alike. That is equally wrong. I talked to my friend after the mass, and he stated he quit going to a particular mass on Sunday, because they have experience on several occasions parishioners will not even move or lift their feet and legs off the floor or kneelers and make them step over them. I thought it was just me.

How can we expect to fill up this church if we will not allow it to fill? Solution? Hit the easy button. It is LOVE. It is always love. It is the only way to teach common sense is by example. For most of us Knights, it is just easy we are all greeters. Smile, smile, smile. Who knows: you might save someone's life. Be aware, people are trying to get a seat. Show them welcome. Greeters welcomed us at the door, right? Should the welcoming stop at the door? Besides its part of your calling to sainthood. If you are in a big open pew, do not be a "bookend." Moreover, if you are sitting in your favorite bookend spot, do not be afraid to step out and welcome them in. When entering the pew, you will hear me ask permission to share the mass wait and give a smile afterwards. I say, "God bless you!" and "Thank you!" We have to get back to genuine simple politeness. We could save and change the world by our simple example.

After the mass, I thank them for allowing me to share the mass with them. These words, I hope are not soon forgotten. I fall short in many things; smiles and gracious, Christ-like greetings is not one of them. SMILE, INVITE, GREET, THANK, AND LOVE. Forgive everyone everything.
