## CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE

Dear defenders of life and of the church,  
 God bless you who are the good men and fathers who guide and defend this "family of families," which is our parish!  
 We just celebrated Father's Day, and in my homily on Father's Day I spoke about the love of God the Father who gives life and provides for us in a wonderful way. I spoke about something new that I learned about while visiting the Vatican this month with our parish Year of Mercy Pilgrimage. I am so excited about something new I learned about the familiar image of the "Creation of Man" which is painted on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel in the Vatican by Michelangelo.  
 We are all very familiar with this image of God the Father, with his long beard, floating in heaven

supported by angels and stretching out his right arm to give life to Adam who is lying on the earth. The fingers of God and Adam are almost touching as life is transmitted to him.

This of course is a beautiful, artistic, portrayal of the way every father gives life to his son. A father is a life giver. He is not quite as close to the child as the mother who bears and breastfeeds the child, but nevertheless the Father does provide life. And of course a father also must provide more than that. A good father does more than just impregnate the mother. He is also "provident" in the sense that he provides for the family. He helps to insure the future of the family.

The interesting new thing that I learned about is famous image is that it shows the future plan that God the Father had in mind for his

child Adam. It reveals the "mind of God" at the moment He created Adam. In fact, the artist Michelangelo painted God the Father floating among a group of angels in the exact shape of a human brain. Renaissance artists were fascinated by human anatomy, and so Michelangelo probably used this shape in order to suggest that he was trying to paint the mind of God. He was trying to show something of what was in the mind of God at the moment when he created Adam. What was the idea of God? What was the plan of God for the future of mankind? What was God thinking when he created man?  
 The answer comes by looking at what God the Father was doing with his left arm and hand.

What if we used it when we traveled?


What if we used it in case of emergency?

He also did the homily for the 5:30 mass that night. If you didn't catch the conference, you may have caught that homily. They also commented how he must have been an evangelical or Baptist convert because of his direct and powerful mannerism. No ladies and gentlemen, he is a cradle Catholic on fire with the Holy Spirit. One of the things that stuck with me, and I enjoyed out of all his talks, is that he referred and recognized us in every other sentence as "Men of God". A title he bestowed on us? Or has God Himself? I feel maybe he just recognized us in this light and each and every one of us should realize that's who we are and accept this recognition humbly. If you missed the conference you not only missed Richard and John's powerful testimonies, but you missed Catholic Deacon Alex Jones. Alex Jones was a protestant pastor that had spent the majority of his life building his congregation and raising his flock, his sheep recognized his voice. In his search for the real presence of the body

blood soul and divinity of the Lord Jesus Christ, he found his way into the Catholic faith and Church and ultimately became a Deacon. What was interesting for me personally about his story was that he was like the rich man who called out to Jesus, "What must I do to inherit the kingdom of God?" We all know the story, "You must sell all that you have, give it to the poor, pick up your cross, and follow me." He answered that call and gave up his ministry (his life) to face great persecution by his loved ones closest to him and become Catholic. This reminds me of the third sorrowful, mystery the crowning of thorns and the fruit of that mystery: courage. What courage it must have taken to make the decision then to act on it. His testimony I'm sure only scratched the surface of what he went through. But in doing so, he brought 50-55 % of his congregation with him into the Catholic faith. His own family and wife questioned him. Talk about humility! So, what was his cross? The Gospel of Luke reminds me of the one lost sheep. Pastor Alex Jones was separated from 45-50% of his flock. We know how Jesus loves each and every one of us regardless of our sins, I wonder how that felt for him? These, of course, were people he loved and guided, and they did not follow like the rich man: turned and walked away. Why did that touch me personally? Well, it will be two years this December that I lost the friendship of one of my greatest lifetime friends. We have not spoken to each other in so many months. I fear, and I could be wrong, but it may in fact be due to my fanatical love for the Lord Jesus Christ (yes, I am a Jesus freak). It hurts so badly some times. It's hard just to breath. She was just one lost sheep added on to my list. Brother Alex lost 45-50%. How does that feel? Well, from his talk, I believe he is still praying for his list of lost sheep, as I am sure you all have a list that you pray for as I do. I would also bet that he is still an inspiration in their lives, even for the ones who do not know it yet. His courage gives me great hope. I say to you "Holy Trinity! I put my hope

in you. Lord, I believe help my unbelief."

The conference was a refresher course, a reminder of who we are, a retreat from the world. Sometimes in battle, we fight and sometimes we retreat and recharge. The theme of the conference was "be strong and show yourself a man." There was an icon of a lion with its mouth wide open and its teeth bared. That kept reminding of something I recently heard. "The truth is like a lion, you don't have to defend it you just let loose and it defends itself."

Let us go out there, go forward, show ourselves a man, and speak the truth.

As I am writing for July article, it is June 19<sup>th</sup>, Father's Day, and so far, I am alone. June month was visit the sick month for our works of mercy, and I am reminded of Father Peter, who may in fact be in the last days of his life. I have been praying for a miracle that he may be restored to 100%. Brothers Richard Braun, Tyson, and I visited him a while ago. I said a decade of the rosary and it brought me great joy to see his face once again and to see all the familiar and unfamiliar faces that came to pray.

We are not alone. Men of God, we have each other; this great fraternity called the Knights of Columbus; an incredible parish headed by a holy and honorable pastor, Father Mark and associates, Father Sekar, welcoming Father Leo; and let's not forget Deacon Ken Ochinerro, and Deacon Ernest Ciccareli. God bless each and every one of you and your sheep. Please, pray for me and my sheep, and I will continue to pray for you and yours.

P.S. The Blessed Sacrament chapel calls all not just priest and nuns. An hour a week is all we ask. I LOVE YOU!

## CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE CONTINUED

Everyone remembers what he was doing with the right arm and index finger. But we usually do not pay attention to His left arm and fingers. It is very interesting. Surprisingly, his left arm is draped over the shoulders of a beautiful woman! Art scholars and theologians have differing interpretations of who this woman is. Some in fact say that it is an angel like all the other angels surrounding God and that therefore the features only seem to be feminine. But art historians point out that the hairstyle of this personage, which is parted in the middle, was a fashion for women at the time of Michelangelo. The face does seem very feminine and the breasts seem to be those of a pre-pubescent young lady. So it does seem to be a woman. But who is this mysterious woman? Why would God be portrayed as having his arm around a woman at the moment of creation?

One possible explanation is that this woman is the "Divine Wisdom" which is spoken of in the Old Testament (Cf. Proverbs 8 and Sirach 24). When God created the world he was helped by "Wisdom"

who is spoken of as a woman. But another possibility is that Michelangelo was depicting the Blessed Virgin Mary herself! Of course Mary did not yet exist at the time of the creation of Adam. But St. Maximilian Kolbe says that before creation God already had in mind a perfect creature who would be the Immaculate Conception. This explanation becomes more plausible when you look at what God the Father is doing with the fingers of his left hand. He is touching a boy in a particular way. Could this boy be the Son of God? In a strange gesture he is using the thumb and forefinger, which are the two fingers that a priest uses to hold the Sacred Host, the Body of Christ, when he offers the Sacrifice of the Mass. This seems to be showing that God the Father was already showing that he is willing to offer his Son in sacrifice to redeem the children of Adam! In this masterpiece we have a cut-away view of the thoughts in the mind of God. While he was creating Adam he already had a plan in mind to save us by sending his

Son born of the Virgin Mary. Adam would sin, and so God would have to send this son as the New Adam born of Mary who is the New Eve (a common theme in early Christian writings). With one hand he is fingering his Divine Son, and with the other he is giving life to the human who would be given the dignity of also being a son of God and a son of Mary.

Even though God the Father is transcendent and floating in space, he nevertheless has a marvelous plan in mind for us his earthly children. This is the loving plan of our heavenly Father! Many of you Knights of Columbus are fathers. Congratulations! You should try to be like God the Father by being close to the children whom you have formed, and by having a loving plan in mind for them!
