CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE

Dear brother Knights,
At a Sunday Mass recently, we heard these words which are very appropriate for this time of elections: "Beloved: First of all, I ask that supplications, prayers, petitions, and thanksgivings be offered for everyone, for kings and for all in authority, that we may lead a quiet and tranquil life in all devotion and dignity. This is good and pleasing to God our savior, who wills everyone to be saved and to come to knowledge of the truth." (1 Tim. 2:1-2) This is a fascinating scripture passage because it tells us that we must pray for our politicians!
St. Paul the Apostle is writing to Timothy, who was another of the first bishops of the early church. Paul himself had "laid hands" upon Timothy to ordain him as a bishop (2 Tim. 1:6). So here we are seeing two bishops in the very early church discussing the importance of praying for the civil authorities. It is a beautiful example of the complimentary roles of church and state. The church has an important role in teaching and advising and praying for those who serve as political leaders, "so that we may lead a quiet and tranquil life... and to come to knowledge of the truth." It is unfortunate that sometimes the bishops don't seem to speak out decisively; and, when they do, the politicians do not listen! As a result, we do not have "a quiet and

tranquil life" in our country. Mother Teresa once said that the greatest threat to peace is abortion. We should keep that in mind when we go to the polls in November. Mother Teresa said in her famous 1979 acceptance speech for the Nobel Peace Prize: "The greatest destroyer of peace today is the cry of the innocent unborn child, for if a mother can murder her own child, in her own womb, what is left for you and for me? To kill each other. Today millions of unborn children are being killed, but we say nothing."
Mother Teresa said something similar in 1994 in the presence of Hillary Clinton. It was at the annual National Prayer Breakfast in Washington, attended by President Bill Clinton and First Lady Hillary. The title of Mother's talk was "Whatever You Did unto One of the Least, You Did unto Me." She spoke about Jesus and John the Baptist in the wombs of Mary and Elizabeth. She said that Jesus brought joy while still in the womb of Mary. (Joy is a frequent theme in Mother Teresa's reflections.) She said that Jesus died on the cross "because that is what it took for him to do good to us — to save us from our selfishness in sin. But I feel that the greatest destroyer of peace today is abortion, because Jesus said, 'If you receive a little child, you receive me.' So every abortion is the denial of receiving Jesus, the neglect of receiving Jesus." Witnesses to the event say that there was an uncomfortable silence in the room, and then applause started on the right side of the room and then spread and lasted over five minutes. During this applause some people did not clap but only sat uncomfortably, including the Clintons and Vice President Al Gore and Tipper Gore. But Saint Mother Teresa did

not let up. She continued: "By abortion, the mother does not learn to love, but kills even her own child to solve her problems. [Abortion is] really a war against the child, and I hate the killing of the innocent child, murder by the mother herself. And if we accept that the mother can kill even her own child, how can we tell other people not to kill one another? ... Any country that accepts abortion is not teaching its people to love one another, but to use violence to get what they want. This is why the greatest destroyer of love and peace is abortion."
Let us pray for our candidates and also for our bishops that they will accept and proclaim the truths which are taught so clearly by the saints and by our Catholic teachings.
We may not be happy with the choices that are given to us on the ballot, but let us keep in mind the urgent message of Saint Teresa of Calcutta: that peace begins in the womb!

FINANCIAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

A couple of questions for you Brother Knights. Do you know what we did last year after all of our events? Is there dust on your Bible?

At the September business meeting our council welcomed two new members - Dan Roman and Jason Sablan. If you were at the Parish Festival the following weekend, they were already immersing themselves with other Brother Knights at our booth.

You often hear rallying cries to help out in this or that event, especially our fund raisers. But do you know who really benefited from those efforts you put in?

Did you know that the Knights donated \$10k in the past year to our parish for a new electronic sign that will be in front of the church?

Did you know that the Knights paid over \$5k to replace the convection oven in Fr. O'Hare Hall's kitchen?

Did you know that the Knights donated over \$5,600 as part of our Adopt a Family program so those families in need could enjoy a Christmas, including gifts, trees and food.

Did you know that the Knights donated \$1,500 to our local Special Olympics not to mention the over 200 volunteer hours at the Special Olympics bowling event and a spaghetti dinner as well?

Did you know that one of our Brother Knights helped coordinate our local Coats for Kids program and we with the help of our parish donors gave over 800 coats to our local Salvation Army?

Did you know that many Brother Knights donate their time in such efforts as the St. Joseph's Bread, helping out with our St. Vincent DePaul program, ministering to the shut-ins, etc.?

Did you know that the Knights help defray transportation costs to the annual West Coast Walk for Life, as well as volunteering to be escorts during that walk? Not to mention providing escort services for our own local Walk for Life on Good Friday?

Did you know that our council along with other councils throughout the state provide support to the Columbian Charities? This Knights program helps Brother Knights in their time of financial need. Five of our members availed themselves of this unique fraternal benefit. Knights

are there for their fellow Knights.

Did you know that our council coordinates each year with our parish and local first responders in the annual Blue Mass usually held in January?

At his rosary, a husband and wife spoke, I think kind of unexpectedly, and told a story of how the husband's alcoholism was killing him and ruining the family. One night the wife had taken the keys from him, and he disappeared to get more alcohol. The wife and kids were on foot with the family dog looking for her lost husband. The husband came across David Wood leaving the Blessed Sacrament chapel or locking the church. The husband asked David if he had a moment to talk and David said yes. They talked for over an hour, and David promised to pray for him. At that time, the wife and family found the husband with David at the church. The husband's comment was "I'm sure

David had somewhere else to be and could have said 'no,' but chose to hear me." He stated: "Every time I went to take a drink that next week I thought, 'Hey, David's praying for me.'"

That gentleman hasn't taken a drink in 4 years. David made a difference in his life. We also make a difference. I loved him as I do all of you and miss him dearly. Please pray for David and Monica Woods. Journey in Christianity retreat is coming up October 14-16th in Sonora at a beautiful location. It is an incredible retreat for adults, 18 and older. They recommend spouses go together. It's Friday night through Sunday; and it's an incredible experience. If you've never been, you're in for a big surprise. I have applications. Please, see me at daily 5:45 PM mass or call 209-840-0165. I will be working this retreat this year, so you won't be alone.
