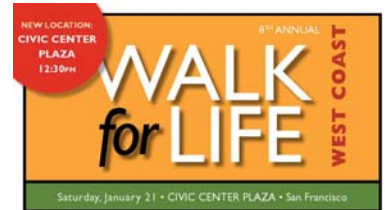


So, with the time we have at our disposal what can we do to serve God and maybe have some good clean fun and fellowship? Consider some of the things that we can do listed below.

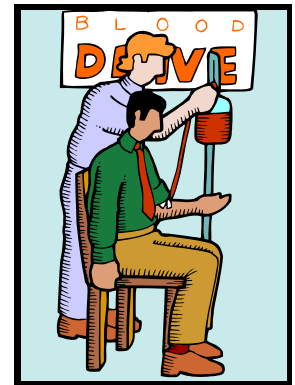
memorial mass on the second Friday of the month
