I open my letter with the first joyful mystery: the announcement that Mary will have a son and the world will have a savior. What a great way to begin the New Year. In real time, we just celebrated the birth of our Lord, but what I really wanted to discuss was the rosary, the Knights and public prayer. First the rosary.



Like Stations of the Cross, the rosary is a guided walk through twenty of the stories of the accomplishment of salvation. A guided meditation, if you will, on the events when God revealed that Jesus had overcome sin and defeated the evil one. These are moments we can glory in and lift our spirits from defeat. The war is won and the foolish one is defeated.

People often ask why Catholics pray repetitious prayer thinking that the rosary is a vain prayer. It probably can be, if you don't pray with the proper intent. Consider a knife in the hands criminal, and you will soon be robbed of your valuables. But a knife in the hands of a chef or a surgeon and the outcome could be delicious or life saving. It's really about the intent of the individual and the proper use of the tool.


Prayer is in itself good if it's directed toward God for the purpose of elevating someone or some event up to union with God's will.

Let's consider the mechanics of the prayer. Each time we pray the rosary we pray five decades or five mysteries listed under the headings of:

- 1. Joyful Mysteries
- 2. Luminous Mysteries
- 3. Sorrowful Mysteries
- 4. Glorious Mysteries

A decade consists of:

- 1. Reciting a short meditation on a specific mystery
- 2. An Our Father (as we reflect on the mystery)
- 3. Ten Hail Mary's (as we reflect on the mystery)
- 4. A Glory Be
- 5. The Fatima Prayer





Once familiar with the specific mystery we can play it in our head and heart like the scene of a movie and come to understand its underlying message(s) more deeply. It's through the prayerful meditation on the revelation of God that we come to know Him better. There is no other way; that's how he made us. It takes time and patience, but it is truly worth it. This is why we must patiently pray the rosary and not rush.

I bring this up because we (the Knights of this Council) are now on the schedule and will be leading the Respect Life Rosary three times this year beginning at 6:30 PM on January 11th, once in July and closing 2013 on Friday, December 13th. This is a great privilege for the Knights and I invite you to attend. You don't have to lead a decade, unless you want to, but I really would like you to come and sit with the guys and just pray with us. The unborn children really appreciate it.

In summary; January 11th at 5:45 PM is mass for the deceased members of this Council followed by the Respect Life Rosary led by the Knight of this Council. Saturday, January 12th is the Blue Mass in honor of the first responders of this community. What a great grace-filled weekend and an awesome way to start the New Year out.
