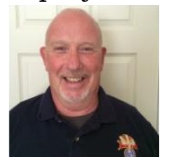
## GRAND KNIGHT'S MESSAGE

Something is truly happening here, and I am so glad to be a part of it! How about you, yes? I wouldn't be surprised if this parish one day experiences its own apparition. Forgive me, I don't mean to sound proud. Believe me, I want this for every parish and everyone. Today is Palm Sunday. I have enjoyed this Lenten season and our time

together, all our wonderful parishioners, my Brother Knights and your beautiful families, the wisdom of our retirees, the growth in faith of our young adults, the laughter and joy of the children. Let us all be like them. Holy Week approaches, and it will be a busy one for everyone, reconciliation mass on Wednesday, the activities on Good Friday including the Walk for Life, and Live Stations of the Cross, all the Easter masses including the Vigil Mass and reception party for RCIA.

## MESSAGE FROM THE FIELD AGENT

### An Ethical Responsibility

In 2016, the Knights of Columbus was named one of the World's Most Ethical Companies by the Ethisphere Institute for the THIRD year in a row. This is a tremendous honor and achievement that all Knights should be proud of! You are part of a fraternal benefit society that puts integrity above all else. We owe it to our founder, to our Church, and to our members. As a business, the Knights of Columbus holds a unique place in the world. Writing in *Columbia*, the Supreme Knight reflected on that uniqueness, noting that:

"Whether we consider the development of our insurance products, the investment strategies that support them, or the outstanding agents who make them available to our brother Knights, our Catholic fraternal 'business' model is truly unique in today's marketplace. We do not divide the world among consumers and customers, shareholders and stakeholders, union members and management.
