

FATHER MARK'S MESSAGE

Dear brother Knights,
In order to remain strong in the order, we must remain strong in the spiritual life. St. Paul says that the only way to have a strong spiritual life is to mortify the flesh: "If you live according to the flesh, you shall die, but if by the Spirit you mortify the deeds of the flesh you shall live." (Romans 8:12-17)

This is ironic because the word "mortify" means to "kill". St. Paul is saying that to have spiritual life we must "kill" or "control" the flesh. The "flesh" is an enemy of the spiritual life and must be killed. The saints of Middle Ages tell us that there are actually three enemies of the spiritual life: the world, the flesh and the devil. St. John of the Cross tells us how to overcome these three enemies.

It may seem overwhelming to have to fight against three enemies at the same time. But, St. John of the Cross reassures us that it is OK to concentrate on one at a time. He says, "Once one is weakened, the other two lose their grip."

St. John of the Cross gives very clear and specific descriptions of how to attack these enemies.

The First Enemy: The World
St. John of the Cross says that the first enemy is the world. For St. John of the Cross, the world

consists in those things that scare us away from the spiritual life. He says that the "world" consists of three frightening beasts. St. John calls them "beasts", but perhaps we can think of them as three "bears", because they are three things that make the spiritual life seem "unbearable". Here are the "three bears":

The first "bear" is fear of losing our friends. We are afraid that our old friends will not like us anymore.

The second "bear" is fear of having to give up our comforts and pleasures. We are afraid we will not have any more fun or enjoyment.

The third "bear" is fear of criticism. We are afraid that people will make fun of us and call us names like "party pooper" or "holy roller."

To combat these three "bears", however, St. John of the Cross gives three "counsels" to protect us. We can think of them as three kinds of "bear spray" which can protect us from these three "bears" of the world:

Show love equally- We should try to love all persons equally, including people who are unpleasant and disagreeable and who are not our best friends and relatives.

Do not worry- We should not allow ourselves to worry about

things like food or clothing or future problems. (cf. Matthew 6:24-34)

Do not look around- Try not to be obsessed with the latest news, trends, fashions and gossip. Do not become upset by looking at people around you. Even if they seem like angels, do not try to compete. Even if they seem like devils, do not let yourself become scandalized, critical or judgment. Occupy yourself with your own affairs.

The Second Enemy: The Flesh
For St. John of the Cross, the "Flesh" means all of our weakness, whether of body or soul. We suffer from concupiscence, which means that we are selfish and disordered. The "flesh" is our inordinate desires and sinful attachments to things like alcohol, drugs, lust, food and social media. We must detach ourselves from these things by practicing mortification. We must "mortify" or "control" our desires by practicing penance. In the apparitions of Lourdes and Fatima, there were repeated calls for "penance, penance, penance". Penance is self-renunciation for the sake of love. It means giving up things in order to show our love for God and to save sinners. If we love God and we want to more souls, we are willing to deny ourselves. **CONTINUED ON PG 5.**

FATHER MARK'S MESSAGE CONTINUED

Anything can be a penance. Anytime we do what we do not feel like doing, or when we don't do what we feel like doing, it can be a form of penance. We can fast from food or from comfortable things. Our Lady of Fatima told the little children: "Make sacrifices for sinners... God is pleased with your sacrifices. John of the Cross emphasized, however, that the "the flesh" refers not only to the weaknesses of our bodies, but also to the weaknesses of our soul. "The flesh" can refer to all of our selfish desires, including the desires of our souls. It refers to the fact that some people have selfish cravings for things of the body, and other people have cravings for "spiritual highs." Some people only pray in order to have pleasant feelings and extraordinary experiences, and remarkable charisms. We should not always want to have "warm tummy feelings" when we pray. We should pray because we love God and not because of what we want from God. We should persevere in prayer even when God tests our love with periods of dryness and desolation (the "dark nights" of the soul).

The Third Enemy: The Devil

The Third enemy is the devil himself and his legions of demons who tempt us. The demons use the world and the flesh to tempt us. That is why St. John of the Cross says that this third enemy is the most difficult to "unmask." The devil tempts us by showing us the attractive things of the world and the flesh. It is hard to discern where and when it is the devil. We must develop the ability to discernment of spirits in order to know whether a temptation is coming from the devil or whether it is coming from our own weakness and our desires for the things of the world and the flesh.

We can be sure, however, that the devil is always lurking. At each of the stages of the spiritual life, he is there to tempt us. He wants to prevent us from advancing toward the final stage of the spiritual life, which is union with God in a "mystical marriage" (the "seventh mansion"). He tempts the beginner who is beginning to enter the first "interior mansions", and the also tempts the saintly soul who is advancing toward the last "interior mansions" where God dwells in the depths of this soul. The devil tries to stop us from taking "these seven steps of love." That is why St. John of the Cross compares the devil to the "seven-headed beast of the Apocalypse" whom we must fight "leaving the beast vanquished after destroying its seven heads..."
