GRAND KNIGHT'S MESSAGE

On October 31st, on All Hallows Eve, The Catholic Church Beatified the founder of our organization, the Venerable Fr. Michael J. McGivney (August 12, 1852 August 14, 1890). Fr. McGivney became the first American parish priest to be beatified. His intercession to perform a first ever in-utero miracle to save baby Mikey. Five years ago, Daniel and Michelle Schachles prayed to Fr. McGivney to intercede to God to save their son, still in his mother's womb with down syndrome. And was given no chance according to the Doctors of surviving a life threatening case of fetal hydrops. It took a miracle to save Mikey. Thanks be to God! And for this reason on May 27, Pope Francis approved the promulgation of a decree recognizing Mikey's cure from a deadly case of fetal hydrops while still in his mother's womb and the miracle was attributed to the intercession of Fr. McGivney. The feast day

for Father McGivney will be on August 13, and we will be privileged to celebrate his feast day in the coming years. December often marks the beginning of rain, snow and cold weather. In the United States and in the Christian World the month of December is associated with Christmas. The first day of winter is either December 21 or 22. this is the shortest day of the year or the longest night. In addition to our Christmas celebration. the following holidays are also celebrated in December. Pearl Harbor Day, Hanukkah, Boxing Day, Kwanzaa, Awareness Week, and National Fruit Cake Month. Here's a little history. December was originally the tenth month of the year in the Roman Calendar. It get it's name from the Latin word "decem" which means "tenth". However, when the Romans added January and February to the calendar, December became the 12th Month. The name was still kept. Beginning the celebration of December 25th as Jesus' birthday. The Roman Christian

historian Sextus Julius Africanus dated Jesus conception to March 25th. He also stated the world was created on a March 2th, which, after nine months in His mother's womb, would result in a December 25th birth. The Church in Rome began formally celebrating Christmas on December 25th in 336 AD, during the time of Emperor Constantine. Constantine as the first Emperor ever to convert to Christianity. in 313 AD issued the Edict of Milan which accepted Christianity as a religion, 10 years later became the official religion of the Roman Empire. The date, December 25th was not widely accepted in the Eastern Empire, as Birthday of Jesus and Christmas did not become a major Christian festival until the 9th century. In the 3rd century, the empire, at the time had not adopted Christianity, celebrated the rebirth of the Unconquered Sun (Sol Invictus) on December 25th. This holiday marked the return of longer days after the winter solstice and also followed the

CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE

Brothers,

Advent brings a series of readings at mass talking about being prepared for something coming. Even the word "advent" means "the arrival of a notable person, thing, or event." The readings back from the 7th and 8th of November, the parable of the 10 virgins waiting for the bridegroom to appear (Matt 25: 1-13), tell us a lot about being prepared. I will include some of my thoughts here about the topic. Let me know what you think.

If a couple wanted to get married here at St. Joseph's, they would connect with the office, who would connect them with one of the two wonderful, wedding coordinators. The coordinators walk with them during their preparation, share with them about the order of matrimony (the ceremony itself), set a date, and then connect them with the priest and/or deacon who would preside over the ceremony, as the church's witness to the matrimony. The happy couple would go together through the ceremony, pledging to "love, honor and obey" each other "in good times and bad, in sickness and in health", etc. And they would be married "until death do them part." Usually there is a reception that will last a few hours, sometimes until the middle of the night, but then the couple goes off for their honeymoon, or at least their life together. There is no waiting, no lamps, and definitely no oil that I know of.

In the first century, the process was a little different. I am not entirely certain, but I don't think that they had wedding coordinators. There might have been a matchmaker who helped the couple to meet, but that's not the same. There would be a ceremony of betrothal, but the couple would not live together. We know that from the time of the Jesus' birth. The Gospel of Matthew states it clearly, "When his mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found with child through the Holy Spirit." There are a lot of non-Catholics who try to say that Mary and Joseph were just engaged at the time, but a few verses later, Joseph is struggling with the idea of divorcing Mary and when waking from his dream in which the angel speaks to him, it says, "When Joseph woke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took his wife." Neither divorce nor taking one's wife happens when a

couple is just engaged.

Marriage in the first century was a two-step process. First, the couple would go before the religious authorities and pledge their fidelity to each other. They would be married, betrothed. Later, sometimes months later, the groom would come and claim his bride, leading her family and the bridal party to the wedding feast that would celebrate their lives together. And their feasts tended not to be a few hours. The wedding feast could last at times for weeks. That's very different from how weddings are today.

So, back to Jesus' parable. The 10 virgins are waiting for the groom to



appear as they are part of the wedding party. They are waiting for the groom to come and claim his bride. There are writings that suggest that part of the delay for coming to claim his bride has to do with the groom having to negotiate with the bride's father. It was seen as a compliment for the negotiation to last a long time, well into the evening, as it meant that the bride was highly treasured and priceless. Once they finally agreed, the groom would go to the bride's home and they would all go together to celebrate together regardless of what time it was.

So, there are the 10 young ladies, part of the wedding party, waiting for the negotiations to end. And they should have known better than to come unprepared. Weddings are a big deal, that is why the parties last so long. But half of them got distracted with other things that seemed more important and are there waiting without any oil for their lamps. Again, things were different in the first century. They didn't have flashlights or cellphones to light up the way in the night. There were no plugs for them to plug in the lamps. Light in

the evening tended to be from oil that was lit. So, if one of them is there and have no oil, they don't have any light at all. They would not be doing their job to light the path. It's almost like being hired to take the photos at a wedding and showing up without a camera and an uncharged cell phone.

What do those young ladies do? They do like most of us who aren't prepared, they start asking for someone else to help them out. "Can I borrow?" The others are wise though. They know that if they share the little that they have there won't be enough for anyone. So, they say, "No." And the wise ones are taken into the wedding feast, while the door is locked for the others. That's important, the door is locked, not just shut, but locked.

With all of that, how does any of this pertain to us? So, there were 10 virgins at a wedding feast at the time of Jesus. Does that really apply to us in Modesto in 2020? It applies to us if you notice that Jesus is telling a parable. In the parables that He tells, Jesus is explaining how the Kingdom of God or heaven will be like. In much of the Bible, a wedding feast refers to heaven itself. In Revelations we hear about the "wedding feast of the Lamb." We know who the Lamb is, right? It's Jesus. He is the bridegroom. So, now go back to the story of how weddings occurred in the first century. The groom would be married but not living with the bride. Then he would return to claim her. If Jesus is the bridegroom, who is His bride? WE are. He is betrothed to US but not living with us here on Earth. Just like the groom in the parable comes back to claim his bride, Jesus will return to claim us. We know that He is coming at the end of time to claim us. The second reading from that Sunday, 1 Thes. 4:13-18, tells us about that, how "For the Lord himself, with a word of command, with the voice of an archangel and with the trumpet of God, will come down from heaven." And all beginning with those that have died will be taken up to heaven. But wait, will it be all? Let's go back to the parable. There were five that were prepared and entered the wedding feast. And what happened with the other five? The ones that were not prepared? They were locked out, look it up to see for yourself. Again, recall that Jesus is explaining the kingdom of

heaven. He says those that are prepared will be taken into the wedding feast of the lamb with Him, while the others will be locked out. He even says that the groom tells them, "I do not know you." That sounds pretty harsh, no? Some are going to get locked out and not even going to be recognized, because they were not prepared.

So, the question for us has to be: Are we truly prepared? Do we have enough oil? Are our wicks prepared for the bridegroom to return and claim us? Do we have the wisdom talked about in the



first reading (Wisdom 6:12-16), so that we can be "free from care"? Are our souls "thirsting for God" as it said in the Psalm (Psalm 63: 2-8). Or are we, rather, caught up with the things of the world? Are we letting the worldly things to cause worry in us? I saw multiple examples before the conclusion of the elections of people who were really stressed and angry. Why were they angry? "Who is going to win the election?" they said in angry tone. "What is going to happen with COVID?"

I'm not saying those things are not important, but if we are "care free", if we are prepared for the second coming, those things pale in comparison. I would say that not being recognized and locked out would be a lot more stressful than COVID or whoever got elected. Those are part of life here on Earth, but they shouldn't cause us to get angry or to be overly stressed.

The Lord tells us in other parts of scripture that we need to live in this world but not be part of the world. We need to prepare ourselves for both our own death and for the end of time. Are we focusing on our eternal home in heaven or on what is happening here on Earth? Remember the last words of the parable of the 10 virgins, Jesus' own words: "Stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour." We need to be prepared for our bridegroom to claim us. Are you prepared? God bless!

WHAT'S FOR DESERT? 1, 2, 3 FUDGE SAUCE!

Items needed to make:

- 1 Large can Carnation Evaporated Milk
- 2 Cups of Sugar
- 3 squares unsweetened chocolate
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

How to prepare:

- Mix evaporated milk, sugar and chocolate in saucepan.
- Bring to boil over medium heat.
- Cook 5 minutes, stirring vigorously.
- Remove from heat, add vanilla.
- Beat with rotary beater for one minute.
- Serve hot or chilled over ice cream or cake.

If sauce seems to thick, add a little evaporated milk to thin out.

DOUBLETREE COOKIE RECIPE

Items needed to make:

- 2 sticks of butter- softened
- 3/4 cup of and 1 tablespoon of sugar
- 3/4 cup packed light brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 1/4 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 2 1/4 cups of flour
- 1/2 rolled oats
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- Pinch of cinnamon
- 2/3 cups semi sweet chocolate chips
- 1 3/4 cups chopped walnuts

How to prepare:

- Mix sugar and butter together
- Add Light brown Sugar
- Add one egg at a time and mix into sugar/ butter
- Add vanilla to mix
- Add lemon to mix
- Prepare flour and baking soda and salt in a bowl

- Mix flour into sugar/egg/vanilla and lemon mix 1 cup at a time and mix well between adding the flour.
- Add oats to the mix.
- Add cinnamon to the mix
- Make sure all is combined well
- Add chocolate chips and walnuts to the mix
- All ready to make cookies to eat.

Preheat oven to 325 degrees and place spoonful size cookie mix onto a parchment paper cookie sheet, cook cookies to desired finish.

ENJOY BREAKFAST CINNAMON ROLLS

Items needed to make:

- 1 package of fast action yeast
- 1/2 cup warm milk
- 1/3 cup of sugar for dough
- 1/2 cup for cinnamon mix
- 1 tablespoon of cinnamon or more
- 1/3 cup of shortening
- 1 teaspoon of salt
- 1 egg
- 3 1/2 to 4 cups of flour
- Vegetable Oil
- 1 stick of butter soften

How to prepare:

- Drop yeast in warm water into a large mixing bowl.
- In another large bowl combine and mix warm milk, sugar, shortening, salt and eggs.
- Add this to the yeast bowl and mix together.
- Add to 2 cups of flour to this liquid mix. Mix together.
- Continue to add remaining flour into the bowl and mix together.
- If dough is too sticky, add flour lightly till elastic and smooth.
- Take dough and form into a ball, then rub small amount of vegetable oil onto the dough ball.
- Cover dough ball in a bowl with saran wrap.
- Place in warm area and let dough rise to double in size.

KNIGHT'S PRAYER GROUP

- Once dough has risen, shape dough into a rectangle (Put some flour lightly on your preparation surface before shaping into a rectangle).

To Make Rolls:

- Roll the dough out to be 15 x 9 inches on lightly flour surface.
- Spread soften butter over the 15 x 9 dough.
- Take 1/2 cup of sugar and 1 tablespoon of cinnamon (mix in bowl).
- Sprinkle the sugar cinnamon mix over the buttered 15 x 9 bowl.
- Roll dough in a cylinder log by taking one end and rolling up, pinch the edges together.
- Work dough lightly to make log even in size.
- Cut the dough log into 8-10 rolls and place on parchment paper on a cookie sheet.
- Cover with saran wrap, let it rise for 45 minutes to let double in size.
- Bake for 10-18 minutes till lightly brown do not let them get to brown) Bake at 350 degrees.
- Enjoy- make a cream cheese topping or other type of topping. Also good with butter.

Mom's Pineapple Upside Down Cake:

The holiday season is here and one of the things families enjoy is dessert! This recipe I got from mom when I first moved out on my home and it is probably the only one I do not adjust. It has stood the test of time. It travelled to Manila for over a decade. Served at family dinners. I must have done this on hundred times. If any part is left over- perfect for breakfast as well!!! A family Hand-Me-down-Kitchen and family tested and approved. Served locally and internationally for decades.

Items needed to make:

- 1/2 cup margarine/butter (usually one stick of Imperial margarine)
- 1 cup of brown sugar
- 1 small can of sliced pineapple
- 3 eggs, separated
- 5-6 tablespoons pineapple juice
- 1 cup sifted flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup white sugar

How to prepare:

- Grease a baking pan (or Pyrex dish), usually 9 x 13 or spray Pam or other non-stick spray.
- Melt the butter/margarine in a small pan or pot.
- Add the one cup of brown sugar Let mix thoroughly till it looks caramel-like.
- Pour the mixture into your baking pan; it should spread to all four corners.
- Arrange the sliced pineapple in the pan. You can keep them whole and set them as a circle or cut them up and arrange the pieces randomly.
- Sift all the dry ingredients (except the white sugar) into a bowl and set aside.
- Separate the egg whites from the egg yolks. Put the yolks into a large mixing bowl.
- In a smaller mixing bowl, mix the egg whites until stiff peaks form.
- Beat the egg yolks until light and fluffy.
- Add the white sugar to the egg yolks and mix well.
- Add the pineapple juice to the mixture.
- Gradually add the dry ingredients into the mixture and continue mixing.
- Fold in the beaten egg whites and mix but not too much.
- Pour the mixture over the pineapple and brown sugar mixture in your pan. It should be enough to cover all of the pineapple, etc.
- Bake at 350 degrees for about 30-35 minutes, (or longer, depending on how brown you want the top of the cake to be or your oven. Some people like the hard caramelization around the edges if cooked longer.
- Take out of the oven and let it cool for a few minutes.
- Find a large pan or cutting board and place it on top of the baking pan.
- Then turn it upside down. You may have loosen the edges with a knife, but the cake should just fall out of the pan.
