Last month there was an interesting article in the Modesto Bee about a man who tried to kill himself by jumping off of the L Street overpass bridge onto the busy 99 Freeway. A Modesto truck driver named Stephen Rodriguez had only 30 feet to react in order not to run over the crumpled body that had fallen onto the road in front of him. Rodriguez swerved and pulled over. He looked into his rear-view mirror and he could see the body moving in the early morning darkness. Then he backed up in such a way that his truck protected the crumpled body of the man who was now trying to crawl. He dragged the man off the road and encouraged him to have hope. He used a flashlight to direct cars into middle lane. In this article it is clear that everyone had the appropriate and natural reaction of trying to help this man to survive. It is wonderful that they did not think of helping the man to do what he wanted to do, which was to kill himself. The police officers at the scene congratulated him. His employer gave him the remainder of the day off with

pay and congratulated him: "Stephen has a good heart. Even under dangerous highway conditions, he did not hesitate to help someone. That's truly heroic. We're really proud to have him as part of the Save Mart family." And Rodriguez himself knew that he did the right thing: "I thought I hit him; it was awful. It was an awful feeling inside to think that I just killed someone. I knew I did the right thing. I just did what was natural."

This newspaper article was beautiful because of the way it commended Mr. Rodriguez for his heroic actions in preventing the death of this suicidal man. Of course, it is beautiful and natural to defend life and to try to lovingly prevent someone from committing suicide. This is what is so wrong with the recent legalization of physician-assisted suicide in California. It amounts to discrimination because young people will be treated differently from elderly or "unwanted" people who have no potential. It is discrimination when some people are given suicide-prevention counseling whereas other people are given the option of suicide. This is the kind of discrimination and

abuse that will now begin to happen in California. It is important that we protect our loved ones and our vulnerable fellow citizens from the evil attitude which would encourage physician-assisted suicide. It is as if all of our elderly parents and grandparents are on that overpass. Will we try to prevent them from killing themselves or will we encourage it? If they choose to jump will we try to prolong their lives or will we help to finish them off?

It got me to thinking maybe we need to recognize those who have passed on in the past calendar year. We tried sometimes to dedicate one of our Fish Fry events to a Knight that had recently passed, but we did not always live up to that goal. My musical research involves research and part of that is documenting someone's passing for history to note. In some cases we learn of a Knight's passing when a relative gets a mailing or call, so once a month I search the Bee's obituaries for mentions of Knights.

In 2015, we lost the following Brothers of our council: John Adams, Emil Carney, Joseph Castagna, Robert Della Santina, Gerard Oftring, and Robert Perry. Along that line of thought it brings up a song that was written and sung by Hank Williams. Hank was unafraid to write and record Gospel tunes, and I have this on an old 78rpm. I modified the words a bit to reflect the passing of a Knight.

At the end of that day, I was exhausted from the stress of the day. By 6:30, I was ready for bed. I knew if I went to bed at that time, I would be awake at 3:30-4:00 in the morning. Then I remembered the Simbang Gabi, the Filipino masses at 5 in the morning had already begun, and there was two completed seven to go. I made the remaining 7; and, if you can imagine you have to be showered and dressed for church and work by 5 AM, so when the breakfast is completed you can still get to work on time. What a great discipline, sacrifice, and humility gathering of parishioners to praise the Lord Jesus Christ before his 2016 birthday! Yes, I did see my friend, Richard Braun, there also. The mass was just what I needed for my grieving process. The Filipino Catholic community is a beautiful collective of souls that complement each other, our Catholic faith, and our St Joseph's Catholic Church very well. Their shared joy and celebration of each other and our faith was exactly what I needed after my father's funeral and for this Christmas season.

I always mention daily Mass and how lucky we are that we have it available to us. I wasn't aware that other parishes do not all share in this tradition. The daily mass calls me: I run to receive its grace. When I mentioned this and the Blessed Sacrament Chapel to a gathering of brothers, one of my brothers mentioned, "That's just not my thing."

I get it, guys. I felt that way also, and I was recently reminded by Father Mark when he mentioned that Mother Teresa struggled because for years she was never comforted by prayer. I thought wow! What faith and hope she maintained because she didn't waiver or stammer. Her humility

and good works and prayer life were Christ like and modeled after His life. STOP right now, and close your eyes and contemplate on St. Thomas for just 10 seconds.

"You believe because you have seen. Blessed are those who have not seen yet still believe!" That being said Daily Mass is not required, nor is the Blessed Sacrament Chapel. Let me reassure you, brothers, it is our thing! And it is calling each and every one of us! Try one morning or night a week or every other week of Daily Mass. Maybe make it the beginning of your date night with your spouse! What do you mean: you don't have date night or time for it? Ha! If you haven't felt called to dedicating yourself to an hour of the Blessed Sacrament Chapel, maybe try 5 or 10 minutes there when you can. You can just be there listen and meditate if you like, if you do not feel called to pray. Again these simple truths I only encourage, they are not required. But I feel all are called. I am reminded of Brother Loy Sagrado, whom I saw at Daily Mass every day, when he stopped driving and his daughter would bring him to mass. One day she wasn't available to give him a ride, and he asked me if I could give him a ride. On that short ride, I learned a lot, that he attended every mass every day, and confession 1-2 times a week. He told me, "I have the opportunity to receive Christ several times a day and reflect on the readings. I'm going to do it." Now, I really don't know if it's acceptable per Catholic doctrine to receive communion multiple times in one day, so I would have to direct that question to Father Mark ["No, it isn't. Only one and twice if participating in a special mass, like a funeral or wedding."] But my personal feeling is that's like being a tax collector in a sycamore tree or a paralytic being lowered through the ceiling. I mean talk about ending strong. I think Loy is still doing his best to do so.

I'm also reminded of the recent passing of Joe Castagna, a Knight

with a strong hand shake, a booming voice, and a smile a mile-wide: always willing to greet you. He always made me feel like a million dollar bill, even when I felt like a 20. He will be greatly missed in my heart and my prayers go out to my personal friends, Mrs. Joe Castagna, his daughter, and their son and daughter-in-law, Elizabeth and Tim Zuniga, and the rest of their family. I attended the concert and midnight mass for Christmas and was pleased to see so many friends that night. I was able to sit and sing with the booming voice of Ed Ibarra and his beautiful wife. I rang in the New Year with New Year's mass and the Holy Hour in the church from 11:30 PM to 12:30 AM. I am encouraged and strengthened by each and every one of you. This is the Year of Mercy: lift someone up who needs your love. Encourage and forgive everyone everything in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. P.S. June 11th Catholic Men's conference at Father O'Hare hall will be great! How many will answer the invitation? I love you all! God bless you all and your beautiful families. Thank you!

Contemplating this, I found this fitting verse in The Book of Proverbs: *"One person is lavish yet grows still richer; another is too sparing, yet is the poorer.*

Whoever confers benefits will be amply enriched, and whoever refreshes others will be refreshed." Proverbs 11:25-25

This brought to mind a story I had heard about the multiplying benefits of good acts, which I want to share with you. There once was a farmer who grew award-winning corn.
