CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE

ENJOY INDEPENDENCE DAY!
(It may be your last!)

Dear Brother Knights,
The Fourth of July is Independence Day, the great celebration of the freedom from oppression and religious persecution that we enjoy in this country. We should try to enjoy this celebration this year, because any day now the Supreme Court could issue a ruling that would severely limit our religious freedom. For the time being, we enjoy the right to believe in the teachings of the Bible and the Catholic Church that marriage is only between a man and a woman. We are free to believe that children have a right to be raised by a father and a mother whenever possible. Catholic priests and Catholic laypersons who work in the marriage industry are free to limit their services to marriages between a man and a woman. Catholic adoption agencies are free to place children where they will have both a father and a mother. Parents are free to send their children to Catholic Schools that define marriage as a sacred bond between a man and a woman.

But by this time next year we may no longer enjoy some of these freedoms. Our faith might become illegal. If the Supreme Court rules in favor of the lawsuit "Obergefell v. Hodges", then the law of the land would be that every citizen of every state in the union would have to recognize a new definition of marriage. If you say that same-sex couples do not have the "right" to marriage, you would risk being accused and prosecuted for bigotry, discrimination, and a hate-crime. Let us pray that the Supreme Court Justices will not try to find something in the constitution which is simply not there. Let us pray that they will not have the audacity to "play god" and give a new definition to marriage. Let us hope that at least allow each state to use its democratic processes to create their own legislation on this issue which is not addressed in the constitution. Some states would be free to follow the wisdom of past ages. Other states would try social experimentation and we would all learn from their mistakes. Ryan Anderson, Ph.D., the William E. Simon of the Heritage Foundation says that the matter should be left up to the states which are the "laboratories of democracy," (words of the Supreme

Court.) If the states can define marriage through the democratic process, people can see first-hand the consequences of changing marriage and decide accordingly, rather than the Court deciding a legal right to "gay marriage" and forcing everyone to wait for the consequences. "The Supreme Court justices have no better ability than anyone in America to predict what the outcome will be. They're not a super-legislature... There's nothing in the Constitution that tells us which of those two arguments is the better argument... "The Court should respect the Constitutional authority of states to make marriage policy."

LECTURER'S NOTES

Brother Knights,
 Welcome to July! In June, we heard from the book of Tobit during the daily masses. As I was listening to the second reading at daily mass one afternoon, I turned to my friend and said, "This is an incredible story! Juan turned to me and said "This is your story." I probably looked a little puzzled and then quickly realized: he is right. It's the story about all of us. In Tobit's reading we hear that he is deprived of his sight for a while; and then, by the grace of God alone, receives his sight back. Is it not through God that we receive all good things. Though it is a question, I choose not punctuate the sentence with a question mark in fear of the Lord. Yes, it is through God that we receive all good things, and I pray you and your family members will continue to receive, through prayer, all good gifts from our Lord Jesus Christ. I was reminded of Saul on the road to Damascus, how Jesus struck him down and blinded him. Saul, one of the greatest sinners of the time: a murder, was given a second chance and blessed by our gracious Lord and given a new name. Paul made very good use of his time to say the least. I was also reminded of our last first degree and about the young men from our parish that we welcomed to our ranks. During that ceremony, they were deprived of their sight for a short time while they contemplated the words of our union with them. The first degree is always a refresher for us and always takes me back to that first night as a Knight. Father Mark's reuniting of Corpus Christi Procession with St. Joseph's church and the surrounding neighborhoods was a great success. I have only two suggestions for next year: more

water and more water. Those providing the water, God bless them, may not have anticipated how many would show up or how hot it would be. The oldest and the youngest suffered, but all completed. The walk also could have used another air conditioned van for those too exhausted to make it. There were two: we could have used three. Maybe this is something that the Knights could help out with next year. We followed our Lord through the streets with police escort first, then Knights of Columbus color guard, then different ministries, then the Priest with the Blessed Sacrament, covered with a canopy carried by Knights followed by other parishioners and a sound truck driven by Juan with Svetlana playing keyboards and singers in the back of the truck. We headed west on Lancey, twisting through the neighborhoods, stopping at the parish's rental home for a prayer or two. We made other stops at other parishioners' houses and got positive feedback from the neighbors and permission whenever possible to stand under their shade trees on the lawns while listening to the priests speaking.

We finally made it all the way to Coleman F. Brown Park. There was already no water. My house is only one block away, so I caught a quick ride home and grabbed every water I had in my fridge, which was only about ten. When I got back to the park, I looked for the oldest and the youngest and distributed the waters as best as I could. Sorry, if I missed you. When the procession got started up again, I noticed something: "They're going into my neighborhood! Cool!" People asked questions and I answered, evangelized, and invited. To the friendly and not so friendly I told them, "I'm your neighbor! Who are we? We're good

old St Joseph's, just up the street. Come check us out. What is this? This is the real body of the Lord Jesus Christ. The unbroken, consecrated host, one bread, one body, this is Corpus Christi. It's a celebration and you are part of that celebration."

It felt good, but why did I look at them different that day? Was it because my church family was with me? Was it because of the Holy Spirit? Does it take a procession for us to get the word out in our own neighborhoods? Maybe it does or just someone to have the vision. My hat's off to all the Knights who helped out, to the color guard who braved the heat in full dress, to all those who carried the canopy, and many other functions and Ed Ibarra who almost single handedly like a border collie kept people moving and groovin'. God bless you, Brothers. I love you all!
