Dear Knights,
 The month of June is a month for Knights to stand up for their faith and to declare their love for Christ! For some people, June is merely the first of the hot summer months, which they dedicate to spending as much time as possible in places where immodest dress is the new normal. But June is the month of the Sacred Heart. The hot weather should remind of us the love that burns in Our Lord's Most Sacred Heart!
 On Sunday, June 7, from 2:30-4:30 PM we will have an opportunity to publicly show our love for Christ. It is the Feast of Corpus Christi we are renewing the tradition of having a public Corpus Christi Procession in the streets of Modesto. Every-one will be dressed properly: Priests will be vested to carry the monstrance with Our Eucharistic Lord; Knights will be dressed in regalia; children will be dressed in their First Communion

dresses and suits; and everyone will be dressed in their Sunday best for this special occasion. I hope every parishioner, especially the Knights of Columbus, will join in this public demonstration of love for Our Eucharistic Lord. The police department will help block traffic so that we can process from St. Joseph's Church to Brown Park and back the church.

Jesus Christ himself asked that we celebrate the Feast of Corpus Christi. He appeared to St. Juliana (1193-1258) and told her that "this Feast is most necessary... so that the faith in this Sacrament would be confirmed... and so that reparation would be made for the insults and lack of respect shown to the Blessed Sacrament." Pope Benedict said that it was because of St. Juliana that the Feast of Corpus Christi was established in 1264 by Pope Urban IV. (Wed-nesday Audience of Nov. 17, 2010). Centuries later, Jesus appeared to St. Margaret Mary and showed his Sacred Heart and similar request: "Behold the

Heart which has so loved men... and in return, I receive from the greater part only ingratitude, by their irreverence and sacrilege, and by the coldness and contempt they have for Me in this Sacrament of Love... Therefore, I ask of you that the Friday after the Octave of Corpus Christi be set apart for a special Feast to honor My Heart." So in June, don't forget to join our solemn Corpus Christi Procession on June 7th, and to remember the Feast of the Sacred Heart on Friday June 12! So many people forget about the love of Jesus and show disrespect for the Eucharist. We need the Knights to stand up and profess love for the Eucharist and for the Sacred Heart!

That venue was the Ryman Auditorium, getting its name from Captain Tom Ryman. He owned a fleet of riverboats but he attended a tent revival put on by Rev. Sam Jones and it is not the first time a life was changed from a sermon. Mr. Ryman wanted to build a building large enough to allow any and all to hear such preaches as Rev. Jones under a roof and not a tent.

That building became home eventually to the WSM Grand Ole Opry. And is still used today to broadcast shows and special events. I can vividly recall attending my first Opry show way back when mom drove us all down to Nashville before 1-65 was even completed. It was a hot summer afternoon and since there was no air conditioning, we bought some of those hand-held fans the little kids would sell to the audiences waiting in line. Now you know a bit about the Mother Church of Country Music. Finally, remember our June meeting will include voting on Officers for the next Columbian year. I strongly urge you to attend and participate.

Brother Knights, Welcome to June, half way through 2015 are we. I was called to help usher the Confirmation Mass. I said, "Yes," but had forgotten I just came down with a cold and probably had no business greeting people at a mass, especially a full capacity mass. Yes, Lord! I smiled and handed out all those song sheets, programs and welcomed everyone to mass. Please forgive me if I passed my sickness gift on to any of you or your families.

Bishop Stephen Blaire was there and gave an awesome homily activity with several youth on the altar to a standing-room-only crowd of parishioners and visitors. I caught myself several times judging in my mind some of the clothes worn by parishioners and guests, mostly women, of assorted ages, 13-years and up. I even spoke under my breath, "Gosh! It's worse than a disco or night club." It was about that time I was reminded that I was overdue myself for a beautiful sacrament (confession). I calmly ushered him out of the church, as he continued to follow the youngest of the girls with many questions about musical theory. She was clearly uncomfortable, but handled herself very well and tried to give him as much dignity as she could. I interrupted him and said, "Excuse me,

but it's time for us to go." I took her hand and explained that my "wife" and I had a dinner date, as I walked her and her mother to their car safely. He latched onto Father Mark. Father, of course, handled himself well, but by the time I got back, I grabbed Ed Ibarra and explained the situation. We calmly intervened and gave Father a quick save. As Ed got Father into the church, I redirected this young man away from Ed's wife and other female parishioners. He eventually left the parking lot.

The reason I mention this story is that we are strong in numbers and we are called to protect our faith, our priests, and, of course, our own. Let's be aware with all the current things going on in our world, just to keep our eyes and ears open. One thing that stuck with me is that when I intervened on the young lady's behalf, the young man said to me, "I can't believe you're doing this to me. I was just starting to understand; she is the only one that has made sense to me all day." Doing this to him? Our savior's words, "that what you do to the least of my brothers you do unto me." 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MESSAGE FROM THE FIELD AGENT

My dear Brother Knights,
 For most of us, the idea of not working is an exciting one. We relish weekends and vacations. We look forward to holidays and special occasions. We plan for retirement and count down the number of days until we arrive at that freedom that we have planned for so deliberately.
